Presby Memorial Iris Gardens



The Presby Memorial Iris Gardens, often referred to as "The Rainbow on the Hill" due to the arching slope of the garden beds and beautiful colors, is located at the base of the 7 ½ acre Mountainside Park. Established in 1927 to honor Frank H. Presby of Montclair, a leading horticulturalist and a founder of The American Iris Society, the gardens showcase over 100,000 blooms during the month of May.

This living museum, listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Sites, offers a spectacular display of thousands of iris varieties to visitors from all over the world. Visitors can take a guided cell phone tour of the gardens and view Iris dating back as early as the 1500's to modern day introductions. Presby is proud to host the 2016 AIS Convention where 887 new varieties will be on display from 93 hybridizers. This bucolic setting is sure to present a magnificent show!



Hildenbrant Garden

The garden is located on a farm near Slatington in the Lehigh valley of eastern Pennsylvania.

For the past ten years I have been retired on the farm and spending all my weekdays learning to grow irises here. Weekends are spent with my wife, Carolee, who works and lives in the New York City area. My daughter Jennifer Cunningham operated the garden commercially for several years, but after her second child time no longer permitted.

The beginning of the garden was TBs and ABs acquired from my father, Lester, who grew and sold irises for 50 years in Lexington, NE. In addition to updating those collections I have added modest collections of SDBs and MTBs. On the beardless side I am expanding my collection of Louisianas, pseudatas, versicolors and siberians. The moist and acidic soil here has



proven quite hospitable to these types of irises.

Over the past three years I have begun a small hybridizing program focusing on arilbred medians. This has lead to a collection of aphyllas, pumilas, tetraploid arils and other median species.

Glenara Gardens



Over 50 years in development, with stops in Maine, Vermont, Florida, New York, and now settled in Pennsylvania, George and Carol Boyce's Glenara Gardens is a cornucopia. An Official AIS Display Garden, this property is nestled in a small valley in the Pocono Mountains, it features an acre lake with shores planted in Louisiana, Siberian, and Pseudacorus iris with large koi swimming by. Stroll the sixty variety lilac walk and view the blooming azaleas, rhododendrons, peonies, unusual trees, shade and rose gardens.

From the metal filigree dome one can see the extensive iris, daylily and companion plant beds. Special features include garden art, the John White Memorial Siberian and Japanese bed, the large Schreiner's of Portland, Oregon bed, and the Pennsylvania hybridizers' bed. Highlighted throughout the six acres are plant specimens from around the world.
